



Library Receives Copy of “Eat First”

The Ethelbert B. Crawford Public Library received a donated copy of Sonia Pressman Fuentes' memoir, "Eat First- You Don't Know What They'll Give You," from the publisher Xlibris Corp.

Fuentes is a 1946 graduate of

Monticello High School, and was one of ten inaugural inductees to the Monticello Central School District Hall of Distinction.

Sonia Pressman Fuentes has been a leader in many feminist organizations, and received numerous awards for her prestigious career in law. Fuentes was one of the founding members of the National Organization of Women (NOW). In 1963, she testified before the House of Representatives Committee on Education and Labor in favor of the Equal Pay Bill, and in 1965 joined the Equal Employment Opportunity Commission as the first woman lawyer in its Office of the General Counsel.

"Eat First- You Don't Know What They'll Give You" tells Fuentes' story, starting with her family's immigration from Nazi Germany. She tells about her life as an immigrant growing up in the Catskills, her educational and professional experiences, and how she became a champion of feminism.

Discussion group for Millennials

The Millennial Book group is a new discussion group at the E. B. Crawford Library. The discussion group is for people in their 20s and 30s, and meets once a month. The group encourages young adults to try new genres of literature, and connect with other people with similar interests. The first three discussion books have centered on magic and fantasy, and The next three

will be humor books.

So far, members have read "The Night Circus" by Erin Morgenstern, and parts 1 and 2 of "Jonathan Strange and Mr Norrell" by Susanna Clarke. At the next meeting on January 16, part 3 of "Jonathan Strange and Mr Norrell" will be discussed. The book for February will be "The Prestige" by Christopher Priest.

Who Was Walt Disney? by Whitney Stewart


Walter Elias Disney Born 12 - 5 - 1901,
